### **Strong Cyprus housing market attracts Britons**

It's easy to see why Cyprus has been one of the most popular locations for Britons to have a holiday home over recent decades. English  $\underline{-00}$  (speak) widely across the island, the sun shines bright and warm right into November and beyond, and the two major airports have regular flights to the UK, four and a half hours away.

'People feel it's a real home away from home. They love the weather, of course, low crime, as well as the fact that English is spoken fluently everywhere, and they even drive on the left,' said Eileen Hardy, director of Paphos-based estate agency Hardy Estates.

But there  $\underline{-01}$  (be) spoilers to this island idyll set in the shimmering eastern Mediterranean. Firstly, there  $\underline{-02}$  (be) the legacy of the island's painful division between the Greek south and the Turkish north. Displaced Greek Cypriots have a claim on land – which  $\underline{-03}$  (uphold) in the UK courts – in the north of the island which  $\underline{-04}$  (resell, subsequently) to British buyers. On top of knotty legal problems came the credit crunch, subsequent global recession and the pound's crash against the euro, which  $\underline{-13}$  – (hit) the buying power of all those Britons. 'If you bought three or four years ago, you  $\underline{-14}$  – (be) very lucky to make your money back selling now,' Ms Hardy said.

However, Cyprus is on the way back. Ms Hardy reports activity comfortably up on last year. Developers  $\underline{-15}$  (build) again in a still sparsely populated island.

Eight out of 10 people around the world consider themselves religious. That figure shows that, while in many countries religion is not as dominant as -01—, it still has a huge influence on us.

What does that mean for the environmental movement? Does a belief in God or the supernatural make people more or less likely -02 -?

It is easy to make up stories to answer this question. You might say that many religions push the idea that  $\underline{-03}$ , in which case surely they encourage a 'let it burn' ethos: what does it matter if the rainforest gets cut down, if the Rapture is next week? But just as plausibly, you might point out that  $\underline{-04}$ , and some such as Jainism even forbid killing animals. This should nudge their followers towards caring for the natural world.

But these are just stories. What does the science of human behaviour tell us?

Let's start with Christianity. Writing in the high-profile journal *Science* in 1967, historian Lynn White proposed that Christian religions undermine wildlife conservation  $\underline{-05}$ . Because the Bible talks about 'dominion' over nature, White argued that  $\underline{-06}$  that 'it is God's will that man exploit nature for his proper ends'.

This was, to say the least, controversial. Other historians and theologians have argued that White was misreading the Bible, and that the text actually implies that  $\underline{-07}$ —. Perhaps more to the point, White offered no evidence about the attitudes or behaviours of actual Christians.

In 2013, researchers tackled that question by asking whether there was a relationship between a country's main religion and the number of important biodiversity areas <u>— 08 —</u>. They found that Christian countries, particularly Catholic ones, tended to have more areas set aside for nature than other countries.

However, <u>**- 09 - White was completely wrong. Other studies suggest that conservative Christians really are less environmentally friendly than other denominations.</u></u>** 

In a study published in 1993, priest and sociologist Andrew Greeley looked at how much Americans were willing to spend on conserving the environment. He found that Christian fundamentalists were less willing, and Catholics more willing,  $\underline{-10}$ . This suggests that it is not whether a person is Christian, but rather what type of Christian they are, that influences their behaviour towards nature.

It also seems that people's attitudes towards the environment can be affected by the way Christianity interacts with other religions.
