In 2016 Prince George started to make public appearances, the first in early July when he donned ear defenders to explore the aircraft at the Royal International Air Tattoo in RAF Fairford – in what could be classed as his first official engagement in the UK.

The famed Scampton based aerobatics team, the RAF Red Arrows, welcomed the Duke and Duchess of Cambridge and Prince George to the Royal International Air Tattoo in Clouchestershire, giving the two-year-old prince a taste of the “high life”.

Squadron Leader David Montenegro, Team Leader and Red 1 at the Air Tattoo helped the youngster into the cockpit of a Red Arrows Hawk jet. Wearing ear protectors, the third in line to the throne gave a shy wave to crowds before climbing in.

The following week Prince George again got the chance to go to work with his parents when the Duke and Duchess of Cambridge joined thousands of soldiers to mark the 75th anniversary of the Special Air Service.

On this occasion the royal party unveiled a statue called the Pursuit of Excellence at the SAS base near Hereford, where they met serving and retired members of Britain’s most elite regiment.

The Red Arrows put on a display and there was a Spitfire flypast as Prince William and Catherine spoke to a group of veterans in their 80s who had served in the original SAS during the Second World War.

The regiment was formed in 1941 by Colonel David Stirling and the SAS barracks are called Stirling Lines in his honour.

Five thousand troops past and present attended the ceremony, including former soldiers previously banned from the SAS camp because they had spoken publicly about their service, such as novelist Andy McNab.

An SAS source said: “It was a fantastic occasion. Soldiers were not allowed to take photographs of the Royal party or the statue, which was of two troopers and an Army working dog.”

Military engagements have been very much to the fore for Prince William recently and he moved from the Air Force to the Royal Navy in late July when he presented newly qualified submariners with their Dolphin awards – in a nuclear submarine’s “bomb shop”.

In his role as Commodore-in-Chief, Submarines, His Royal Highness privately toured the HMS Artful, an Astute Class submarine, the most advanced and powerful attack sub operated by the Royal Navy.

The warship, commissioned earlier this year, had returned to the UK following a successful trial period in the western Atlantic.

To qualify as a submariner, the sailors had to demonstrate a detailed knowledge of more than 30 complex engineering systems which operate the nuclear submarine and keep its crew safe.
