Why you're asked to put your phone on airplane mode during a flight

Signals from your mobile phone have the potential to disrupt the plane's navigation and radio systems if not disabled. If you've ever been on a plane, you'll be well accustomed to switching your phone into airplane mode when you board – but you may not know exactly why this is required.

It's something that plane passengers have been asked to do since mobile phones were first brought on board, allowing people to use their devices while switching off all mobile data, Bluetooth, and cellular. This is so that the phone's radio-frequency (RF) signal transmission is disabled to prevent it from interfering with the aircraft's systems.

But with technology changing drastically over the years, and with Wi-Fi even available now on some modern aircrafts, some travellers have been left wondering whether switching their electronic devices into airplane mode is still necessary. But the signal that mobile phones give off still has the potential to disrupt the plane's navigation equipment, landing guidance system, and cockpit controls.

As your phone is out of range of telephone towers while in the air, it would be constantly searching for a connection if airplane mode isn't turned on – this results in it sending a strong electrical signal as it looks for a connection. These signals can cause a distracting sound in the pilot's headphones and can interfere when crew members try to communicate with each other through the in-flight speaker system.

A pilot said that it's never been proven that a mobile phone signal has "interfered with the navigation performance of an aircraft." However, he added, "Just because it's never happened doesn't mean it will never happen."
